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The Annual Report of Leitrim County Council is the principal opportunity to outline its performance in the previous year. The report as in previous years follows the format of the Corporate Plan which sets out the objectives upon which which the work programmes of the Council are prepared year on year and matched to the Annual Report. The Annual Report is accompanied by a set of forty two service indicators. While these indicators only cover a narrow range of the activities undertaken by Leitrim County Council they are supplemented by additional information in this report which is presented in the form of outputs.

During 2006, Leitrim County Council continued to advance As a public service agency quality customer service is one objectives aimed at achieving its ultimate corporate goal of the continued development of Leitrim as a location of choice to live, work and invest in.

In this context significant progress was made during 2006 in areas such as the provision of physical and social infrastructure, customer service, and environmental improvements.

The CPO on the N4 Dromod Rooskey Bypass Project was confirmed in 2006 and a Design and Build Contract commenced in Quarter 3 with a mid 2008 scheduled Towns and Villages Sewerage Scheme and the €18m Carrick-On-Shannon Sewerage Scheme. The mid term review of our Social and Affordable Housing Action Plan was completed during the year with output targets revised and increased including a significant increase in anticipated Voluntary Housing Output. New playgrounds were opened in Manorhamilton and Fenagh.

of the many benchmarks by which the performance of the Council is judged. In relation to Quality Customer Services a new Customer Service Centre is under construction in Manorhamilton which will provide access to a wider range of Council services in the north of the county. A comprehensive Customer Service Survey was also undertaken in 2006 and work is ongoing on developing responses to the issues raised. The Council continued to improve its e-services with enhancements in access to online planning information and the launch of our redeveloped website. Our Customer Contact Management System has been fully rolled out and available at our Cash Desk. The facilities and services available in our Libraries have also been enhanced through optical scanning services, progression of the local studies digitisation project, pilot of a childrens reading project with the County Childcare Committee and digitisation of newspapers with Leitrim Observer and also availability of other national papers.

Staff training forms an important element in the development 2006 also saw a significant focus on the development of a quality customer service. In 2006 staff training had a particular focus on Health and Safety Training and Disability Awareness. The new Performance Management and Development System (PMDS) has been successfully rolled out throughout the organisation while the national and local Service Indicators have been kept under regular monitoring and review. In the context of financial management major improvements were made in 2006 in relation to procurement, risk management and health and safety.

Substantial progress continued to be made in 2006 on the Town and Village Enhancement Programme with works undertaken in a number of locations including Keshcarrigan, Fenagh, Killargue and Dowra. Work also commenced in a number of Housing Estates on CLAR Estate Enhancement Projects. The Replacement Connaught Waste Management Plan 2006-2011 was adopted and very significant increases in recycling activity were achieved.

of the Leitrim tourism product in conjunction with the County Development Board and in close co-operation with tourism bodies at both local and regional level. Initiatives undertaken include the refurbishment of the "Old Barrell Store" in Carrick-On-Shannon as the County's Tourism and Arts Office, development of the very successful Leitrim Roots Festival and commencement of the Cross Border Angling Project. Funding has also been secured for a new County Marketing Initiative in relation to living, working and investing in Leitrim.

The foregoing is a strong indication of a positive performance during 2006. Other developments and outputs are detailed throughout the report, which would not have been possible without the continued support and dedication of members and staff alike, to which we extend our utmost appreciation.

The Urban Framework Plans for the three towns, Drumshanbo, Drumahair, and Drumkeerin, which were brought forward to Public Consultation in early 2006 were adopted by the Council.

There was one variation to the County Development Plan which involved the addition of 2 no Protected Structures. This was adopted on 3rd April 2006.

Development Management

During 2006, 1,629 planning applications were processed of which 27.38% or 446 were invalid. 978 decisions were issued during the year of which 804 or 82.21% were decisions to grant. 174 applications were refused, giving a refusal rate of 17.79%.

A total of 510 pre planning queries were dealt with in 2006.

Heritage Management

In support of the additional buildings included in the Register of Protected Structures, Leitrim County Council gave provisional approval in 2006 for Conservation Grants for 7 projects designed to assist in conserving for the long term these protected structures. The provisional approval was for funding of the value of €75,777.00. Of these 7 pre-approved projects, five progressed to execution in 2006 together with 3 of the 2005 projects, with a total grant allocation of €83,380.21 being paid out for works carried out during this period.

During 2006, the Planning Authority provided 21 statutory declarations under S57 of the Planning Act 2000, for works to protected structures. This compares favourably with previous years - in 2005 when 7 declarations were issued, no declarations being requested in 2004, and only two were requested in 2003.

Infrastructural Provision

Significant progress was made in planning and provision in the areas of social, recreational and transportation infrastructure as detailed under the infrastructural delivery objective.

Economic Development

The County Development Board continued to progress the implementation of its strategy in 2006 including its Action Plan 2006-2008. A number of initiatives were undertaken with regard to the promotion of the economic development of the county. The Boards Third level Initiative progressed during the year with 3 different colleges – Athlone IT, Fermanagh College and UCC now running courses in the county. The Council was shortlisted for the Chambers Ireland Excellence in Local Government Award for Economic Development for this third level initiative in 2006. The Council was also shortlisted for the overall Local Authority of the Year at the Chambers Awards. The Review and Action Plan agreed in 2005 identified the need to look at ways of increasing the profile of the County as a good place to invest and set up business in as wall as enjoying a good quality of life. A review of all marketing material in the county was carried out in 2006 and this was compared to the marketing material for a number of other areas across the country. The Economic Development Group agreed on a Marketing Strategy to be carried out in 2007 which included the development of new promotional material, rebranding and production of a DVD.

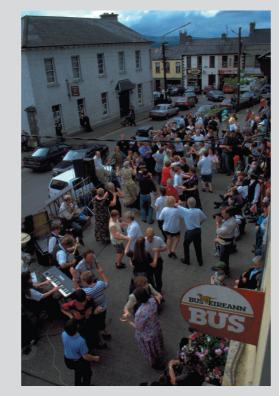

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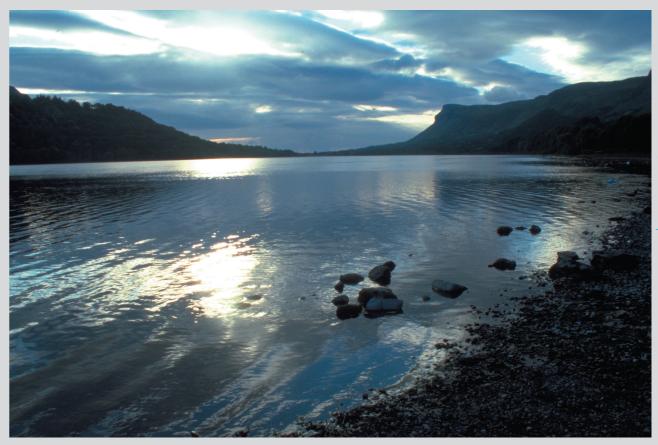
Tourism Promotion

The Council continued its active work with Leitrim Tourism who continue to market Leitrim as a tourist destination through its presence at overseas shows and shopping centre promotions in Ireland, Continental Europe and the United Kingdom Press and radio campaigns, including radio programmes in the USA and the United Kingdom and a feature on RTE's "No Frontiers" Programme distribrution of brochures and a promotional DVD to all tourist offices throughout Ireland; familiarisation trips for media and tour operators and website development and promotion.

Leitrim Tourism continued to develop working partnerships within the county during 2006 including assistance with events such as the Leitrim Roots Festival 2006; Session at the Shannon 2006; Jamestown Heritage Barge Event; Green Box Conference; and King of Clubs Angling Competition. The cross border tourism angling project was continued to be marketed by Leitrim County Council – this is an INTERREG funded programme which involves a survey of a number of the more important angling lakes in Fermanagh and Leitrim to see how fish stocks are developing. It is intended to improve facilities in a number of strategic locations and to market the angling product in the region more vigorously.





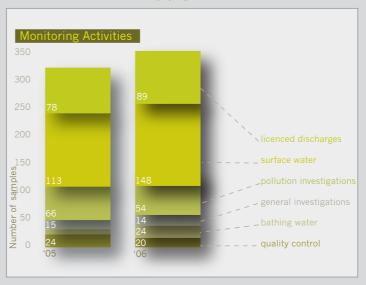


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Pollution Control

45 complaints were received regarding water pollution in 2006 and 6 complaints were received regarding air and noise pollution. 32 no. legal notices in total were issued under various Sections of the Local Government Water Pollution and Air Pollution Acts. 39 warning letters were issued under the Local Government Water Pollution Acts with court action pending in three of these cases due to non compliance. 163 planning applications were processed for agricultural developments with an emphasis on Nutrient Management. An approved panel of assessors for single house sewage treatment site suitability assessment was established in 2006. This will assist in improving the standard of assessment of sites and consequently protect ground water and surface water from pollution.

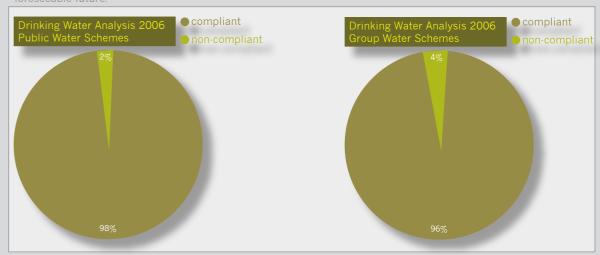
Public Water Supply



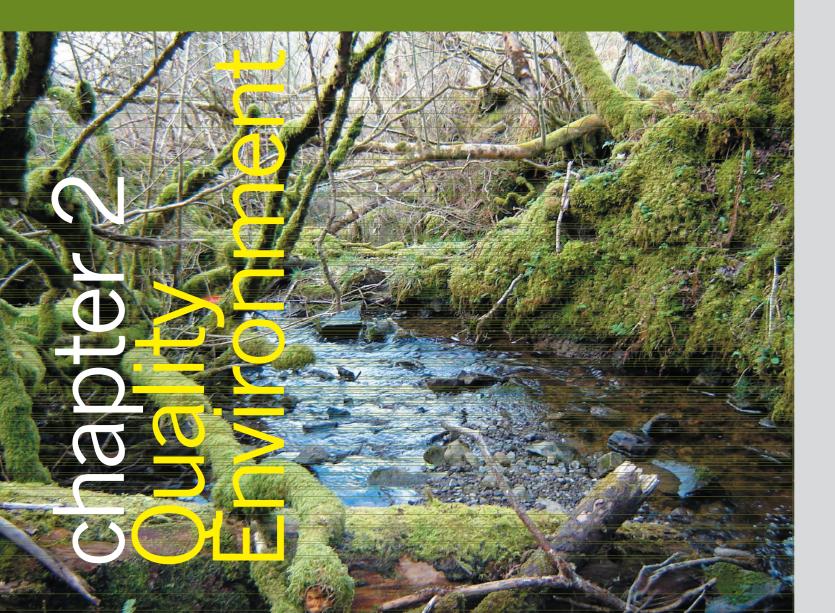
4,753,848 cubic metres (1,045,846,560 gallons) of drinking water were produced at the Council's six water treatment plants in 2006 Our extensive water quality monitoring programme continued apace in 2006 with approximately 3477 separate tests being completed on water sampled from households. We also carried out over 9,500 tests at our treatment plants throughout the year. Overall the drinking water quality achieved the same high standard as in previous years. We also connected an extra 463 dwellings to our water pipe network.

Water Framework Directive

The Water Framework Directive was introduced in December 2000 in response to a general decline in water quality throughout Europe and is the key European Directive under which Ireland's waters will be managed for the foreseeable future.



The Water Framework Directive takes a holistic approach, encompassing the full water cycle including groundwater, rivers, lakes estuaries and coastal waters. The quality of our water will be determined by its chemical composition and its ability to sustain aquatic plant and animal life, including fish. The Water Framework Directive requires that the management of all water environments be based on natural river basins/catchments rather than county boundaries. There are 3 River Basin Districts in County Leitrim and we are members of the Management Group and Steering Group on all three Projects.



Environmental Awareness

The Water Framework Directive Monitoring Programme for surface waters was prepared for County Leitrim in consultation with the River Basin Projects and the EPA in 2006. This has now been published as part of the National Monitoring Programme by the EPA and will commence in Jan 2007.

Environmental Awareness

Through the Environmental Awareness Programme 80% of schools in the county (primary and post primary) participate in the Green Schools Programme. This represents a 14% increase on the 2005 Participation rate. Six Green Flags were awarded in 2006. Green Schools who participated in Local Agenda 21 projects included St. Clare's Comprehensive School Manorhamilton who engaged in school composting and organic gardening. Launched in 2005, the 'Adopt a Road' and 'Adopt a Bring Bank' anti-litter programmes were successfully rolled out to community groups in 2006 with 8 new participants joining the "Adopt a Road Campaign" and 5 new participants joining in the "Adopt a Bring Bank Campaign". This partnership approach between the Council and the community underlines joint responsibility in tackling the problem of litter. 9 successful projects were awarded under Anti-Litter Awareness totalling €13,000 in funding from the Department of Environment which was co-funded by Leitrim County Council. The projects include school initiatives, Community initiatives such as Adopt a Road, a targeted campaign in the licensed trade sector and a film project by local youth film clubs. 3 successful projects were awarded funding under Local Agenda 21 in 2006 totalling €8,720 in expenditure. Projects include Community Composting and Nature Trail Development.

Leitrim has an excellent network of 38 bring banks for glass and can recycling. This figure equates to three times the national average –8 bring banks per 5000 population in comparison with a national average of 2.6. 2006 was the first full year of operation for the two recycling centres at Mohill and Manorhamilton, which processed 291 tonnes of recycled materials (paper, plastics, metal, batteries and green waste). In addition 6.7 tonnes of household hazardous waste was taken out of circulation. Over 130 tonnes of Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment was collected at the two sites in co-operation with registered retailers and householders. Recycling volumes recorded via both the bring banks and recycling centres increased by 30% from 705 tonnes (2005) to 1181 tonnes (2006). Following the successful

Environmental Enforcement

Through the work of the Waste Enforcement Officer and our five Community Wardens, a total of 725 environmental complaints and enforcement issues were processed during 2006. Of the 725 complaints 433 required enforcement procedures. A total of 139 on the spot fines were issued with 23 having legal proceedings taken or pending at the end of 2006. 26 Waste Permits applications were received in 2006, 21 were granted; 2 were refused and 3 awaited decision by the end of 2006. Revised Waste Presentation Bye Laws were adopted by the Council in 2006 to include for proper management of waste at Apartment Blocks and complexes. Occupants of these Apartment Blocks and complexes are currently availing of a segregated waste collection service and are currently recycling approximately 20 % of their waste. Ongoing inspections were carried out in 2006 on established waste collection routes to enforce compliance with the Bye-Laws. Compliance varies depending on location but is generally of the

78 cases of significant illegal waste activities in various forms, such as illegal dumping of construction and demolition waste, fly-tipping of waste, burning of waste, oil pollution as a result of end of life vehicle dismantling etc. were dealt with during the year. In most cases site remediation/clean-up is required to resolve the situation. 6 of the 78 cases have been unresolved and will require further enforcement action. 175 no. notices were issued requesting provision of information in relation to management of waste. 145 requests were sent to businesses in the County to determine if packaging waste generated in Leitrim is being managed in accordance with the regulations.

Waste Management Plan

The Replacement Waste Management Plan for the Connacht Region 2006-2011 was approved by Leitrim County Council on 25th May 2006. The Plan outlines a regional approach to integrated waste management based on the hierarchy established in the EU Framework Directive on Waste, and sets the targets of 48% recycling, 33% recovery and 19% residual waste disposal of all municipal waste arising in Connacht by 2013.

Waste Water

We monitor the discharges from our 18 waste water treatment plants to ensure compliance with the Urban Waste Water Treatment Regulations. In 2006 we carried out 1,666 separate tests on these discharges. Our results show a high standard of compliance with these regulations. In the year we connected an extra 321 dwellings to our sewer

Transportation - Planning & Maintenance

Planning, design, construction and improvement of various road projects continued apace in 2006, with a total spend of €23.3 million being incurred.

On the N4, Jons Civil Engineering Ltd were appointed contractors for the Dromod/Rooskey by-pass, and work commenced in July. It is anticipated that the project will be completed in 2008. Also on the N4 at Dromod Beg and Rooskey, improvement works were carried out on bends leading into both villages.

A preferred route corridor for the Carrick-on-Shannon by-pass has been identified, and design work was on-going at year end, in order to finalise road line and the extent of the land take required for the project. The implementation date for the scheme will be determined by its rating in the National Roads Authority national works programme.

On the N16, design work on the proposed 1 km section of the N16 at Kilmakerril/Cornacloy in the vicinity of the Bog Cross was completed in 2006. Following on failure to acquire the land by agreement, a Compulsory Purchase Order was made and approved in 2006. Works are scheduled to commence in 2007. Also on the N16, works consisting of an overlay on the Western approach to Manorhamilton at Cornastauk were completed. Planning for the Manorhamilton/Glenfarne section of the N16 progressed during 2006 and it is hoped to finalise the route corridor in 2007. On the Glencar to Sligo County Boundary section of this route, planning works commenced with a view to selecting a preferred route corridor in 2007.

Expenditure on Non National roads amounted to €13.9m, which included € 0.97 m. from the Councils own resources. In the course of the year in excess of 610,000 sq metres of surface dressing was completed - 7.9% of the total Local and Regional roads network in the county. Restoration improvements accounted for expenditure of €4.75m on 142 km of the network. This expenditure also includes co-funding under the Clar Programme, as administered by the Department of Community Rural & Gaeltacht Affairs, on some secondary and tertiary - Class 2 & 3 local roads, together with a small allocation from Coillte for two Class 3 Forestry roads in North Leitrim. Substantial realignment works were carried out to 8.4 km on Regional Roads at a cost of €3.94 million, with the aid of Specific ___ Improvement Grants, at nine locations throughout the county, such as Newtowngore on the R201, Tully Ballinamore on the R204, Cornaroy Drumshanbo on the R280, and also on local forestry road at Beagh Beg, Carrigallen.

There were 205 beneficiaries from the €2.1m expenditure on Local Improvement Schemes, which included 80 schemes covering a road surface of 33.95 kms. In 2006 the allocation from the Department of Environment Heritage & Local Government was augmented by a supplementary allocation of 50% from the Clar Programme.

2006 was the final year of a three year footpath renewal programme, and total expenditure of € 310,000 was incurred, which involved substantial construction/improvement works. The public lighting programme involved the maintenance and extension of the network of 1800 street lights, which was financed from the Councils own resources.

During 2006, the North Leitrim Remedial Works Scheme progressed. The scheme was 90% complete at the end of the year. The Scheme included major refurbishment works in the following Estates – Dispensary Field, Kinlough, McDermott Terrace and Hillside Crescent, Manorhamilton, Drumlease, Dromahair, Dristernan, Drumshanbo (3 houses) and some minor works in Glencar. The total value of this Scheme is €1.4million.

Detailed proposals have been forwarded to the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government for approval to go to Tender for Remedial Works Scheme in South Leitrim. The Scheme will include major refurbishment works in the following Estates – Dristernan, Drumshanbo, Breffni Crescent, Carrick-on-Shannon, Treanmore, Mohill and Bredagh, Carrigallen. The total value of this Scheme is approximately €4.5 million.

Funding approval for €1.4m was granted for a Remedial Works Scheme for major refurbishment works on 20 Rural Cottages throughout the County.

In the context of maintaining our present stock, new heating systems were installed in 25 houses at a value of €260,000. A grant of €225,000 was received from Department of the Environment, Heritage & Local Government for this work and Leitrim County Council provided €120,000 from its own resources. As part of the Council's Planned Maintenance Programme doors were replaced in 26 houses in 2006 at a cost of €48,000, and windows were replaced in 6 houses at a cost of €12,000.

943 no. local authority houses were maintained and managed which generated 238 maintenance requests during 2006 of which 227 had been dealt with at year end. Grant aid in the sum of €576,644 under the Essential Repairs Grant Scheme issued to 123 applicants while €953748 issued to 153 applicants under the Disabled Persons Grant Scheme

The major development of Carrick-on-Shannon Halting Site continued throughout 2006. Phase 1 is due for completion in February 2007, with Phase 2 due for completion in October/November 2007 at an estimated project cost of €3million.

Water Services Investment Programme

The €17m Towns & Villages Sewerage Scheme, which will improve or bring waste water treatment plants to Dromahaire, Kinlough, Tullaghan, Drumkeeran, Kiltyclogher, Ballinaglera, Killargue, Cloone, Jamestown, Drumcong and Rooskey, commenced construction in 2006. Two contracts were awarded for the construction of the pipe networks, one in the north of the county and the other in the south. The €18m Carrick on Shannon Sewerage Scheme commenced construction in 2006 with the construction of an interceptor sewer along the banks of the River Shannon.

Our Rural Water Programme continued in 2006 with €2.5m spent in the year. Improvement works were carried out in Killargue, Killavoggy, Shriff, Friarstown, Newtowngore, Fawn/Killarkin, Drumrane/Costra and Corrawallen. Planning and designs are at an advanced stage for improvements to the Ballinaglera, Leckaun, Carrigallen and Aughnasheelan, Schemes with construction due to start at the beginning of 2007 for the upgrade to the Brackery More, Brackery Beg, Mullies and Cooladonnell schemes.

€1.5m was spent on our Small Works programme with a new waste water treatment plant in Aughnasheelan, an extension to the waste water treatment plant in Dromod, improvement works to the waste water treatment plant in Carrick-on-Shannon, sewer and water main extensions at Carrigallen.

Leisure and Recreation Provision

Leitrim remains one of the counties with the highest ratio of equipped playgrounds per head of population in the country. In 2006 a fine new playground was developed at the Fairgreen, Manorhamilton. This was done following public consultation and it is very popular with local children.

Customer Service

Leitrim County Council in 2006 and remained to the forefront of our change management agenda. A new customer service desk was established in Aras an Chontae in 2006. The customer service desk facilitates customers in accessing information including application forms relating to the range of Council services. A Customer Service Survey was completed in 2006 as a follow up to one completed in 2004. Survey forms were issued to 1585 customers across the range of service areas and were also made

available to visitors to our offices and on our website. A total of 336 completed surveys were submitted and indicated that in relation to the courtesy and friendliness of staff there was a very positive response rate of 94/96%. Actions/proposals to further improve customer services arising from the results of the survey will be implemented throughout 2007. A new Customer Service Enquiry Facility is now available on the Council's website which enables customers to submit queries by email. 8122 customer contacts were recorded on the Council's Contact Management System in 2007 with 93% of contacts being dealt with within the deadline set in the Customer Services Action Plan (i.e 4 weeks) 64% of contacts were dealt with within one week.

Library Service



At the end of 2006 22% of the population of the county were in date registered members of the library service. A total of 113,473 books were borrowed from Leitrim Libraries in 2006 while free internet facilities were in use for a total of 29872 hours between the nine branch libraries. Full time Libraries were open 37.9 hours per week and part time libraries for 10.7 hrs per week.

Motor Taxation

During 2006 our Motor Taxation Department handled 32622 requests involving the collection of €5.17m in revenue, representing a 6.07% increase on 2005. 61.54% of all requests were dealt with over the counter, with 25.64% being dealt with through the post, of which 84.47% were dealt with on a same day basis. Almost 13% of our customers used the motor tax on-line facility.

A total of €1318693.99 was allocated in 2006 on fee and maintenance grants representing 142 new grants and 205 renewals. Information sessions were held during the year in secondary schools and an open day was held in Carrick-On-Shannon. All secondary schools in the county received an information pack detailing the terms of the Scheme. The average time taken in 2006 to process new applications was 7 days and the average time to process renewal applications was 1 day.

Register of Electors

The Register of Electors for 2006/07 was published in February 2006 and showed a voting population of 23735. The breakdown of registered electors across the 4 Electoral Areas was Ballinamore - 6212; Carrick-On-Shannon - 6620; Dromahaire 5608 and Manorhamilton 5295. In preparation for the publication of the 2007/08 Register the Council during 2006 engaged in an intensive door to door campaign to update the Register to be published in February 2007.

Veterinary Services

The inspection regime for the licensed abattoirs in the county was continued in 2006. Our Veterinary Inspectors carried out 434 post mortem examinations on 4602 animals in 2006.

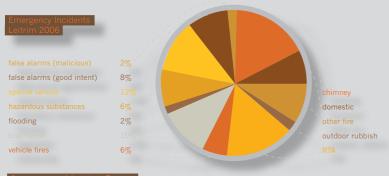
Fire Services

During 2006, Leitrim Fire Service responded to 283 emergencies. The average response time for the part time stations was 4.91 mins. 193 inspections were carried in 2006 in accordance with Fire Services leglislation. In addition 85 Fire Safety Certificate applications were processed during the year.

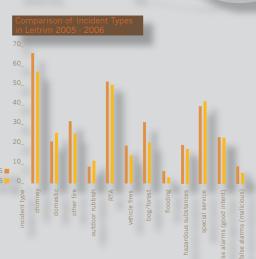
During the year the Major Emergency Plan was reviewed and updated and circulated to Council staff. Briefing sessions were held for all senior management in Leitrim County Council in December 2006.

The replacement Hydraulic Platform in Carrick-On-Shannon was delivered in early 2006 and a new Emergency tender vehicle valued at €211000 was delivered in March. Two second hand 4x4 vehicles were purchased and were put into operational use in Manorhamilton and Mohill. An application for capital funding for new hand portable radios were also submitted to the Department of the Environment Heritage and Local Government in 2006.

Community Fire Safety remained to the fore in 2006 with members of Leitrim Fire Service at all levels involved in bringing the fire safety message to all age groups within the community from young school children to the elderly. A number of different campaigns were held during the year including National Fire Safety Week; Presentations on fire safety to schools under the



Primary Schools Programme and to active aged groups; signs on approach roads to

National Disability Strategy

Under the National Disability Strategy Leitrim County Council received funding in the sum of €277200 from the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government (DOEHLG). This funding was spent on the following: Access audits of Council amenity areas; playgrounds and burial grounds and of Council websites; Disability Awareness Training for all Council staff; Audio Books / Scanners and sensory panels for Council Libraries and Capital Works to improve disabled access to Council buildings.

Leisure and Recreation

In 2006 there was in excess of 170,000 users of Leitrim Leisure Centre which comprises of a 25m pool with childrens and learners facilities, a gym, fitness suite, all weather pitches and playground. Drumshanbo Swimming pool was open from June to end of August and was used by more than 3000 visitors.

Aisling Gheal Liatroma

The Leitrim Mobile Cinema continued to operate during 2006. The cinema's programme of world cinema screenings was expanded and also played at a variety of schools, festivals and other events.

Through assistance from the Arts Council and in cooperation with the Irish Film Institute a second Adaptation Film Festival Weekend took place in September in Glenfarne and Dromahaire. On this occasion the festival focused on the adapted works of William Trevor. As well as public involvement, the festival attracted the involvement of some of the key creative

- Pat O'Connor who came from England, who fielded questions about the three works in the programme which he had directed at post-screening interviews.
- Robert Cooper, director and producer of a number of works in the programme also came from England and also did a public interview post screening.
- Actors Tom Hickey and John Kavanagh also came for the screenings of their films and enhanced the local

Scheme under the Official Languages Act 2005

In December 2006 the Department of the Gaeltacht, Community and Rural Affairs approved the Council's Irish Languages Scheme 2007-2009. This Scheme details the services the Council will provide through the medium of Irish and the measures to be adopted to ensure that any service not provided by the body through the medium of the Irish language will be so provided within an agreed timeframe.

Participative Democracy

Pride Building Initiatives

During 2006, Leitrim County Council continued various initiatives aimed at building pride through community

For the fourth year the Cathaoirleach Awards Scheme formally acknowledged people who voluntarily give of their time to help others. The award categories in 2006 included Community, Arts, the Special Endeavour Award and An Saol Eile (Older Persons) Award. A total of 30 nominations were received and awards were presented at an awards ceremony held on 25th May 2006. The winners in each of the categories were - Community Category - Ms. Mary Kerrigan; Arts Category (Individual Award) – Ms. Sandra Vernon; Special Endeavour Award – Mr. Paddy Doyle; An Saol Eile - The Older Persons Award - Drumreilly Active Age Group. The overall Winner of Cathaoirleach's Award Scheme 2006 was Mr. Paddy Doyle.

Under the Council's Estate Management Programme six new Residents Associations were established in 2006. Each of the 18 established Resident Associations received a contribution towards their running costs from Leitrim County Council in 2006. The annual Environmental Awards Scheme for estates was judged over the summer months in recognition of Residents participation in the upkeep and enhancement of their estates.

Under the Council's Community and Voluntary Sector Grants Scheme 40 grants were allocated to the value of €14,800.

Leitrim County Council entered this Pride of Place competition for the third time in 2006. This competition recognises the efforts of communities to do work together with the local authority and businesses to improve their area. 4 communities were entered in four different categories as follows: Keshcarrigan in the Under 500, Drumsna in the

All communities put a great effort into their entry and examples of their work are available on the Pride of Place section of www.leitrimcoco.ie

Drumsna was shortlisted in the 500-1,000 population category.

Significant progress was made in promoting the Floral Pride initiative through a workshop for entrants held in April and increased promotional activities. 7 schools entered the Primary Schools category in 2006.3 secondary schools entered the new secondary schools competition. 10 Communities entered in the Population Categories.7 businesses entered the Best Business Display category. An Awards ceremony was held in September with Drumsna

Participative Democracy

Enhanced local democracy has been achieved through the continued successful operation of the Strategic Policy Committees, County Development Board and the Community Forum. The Council worked closely with County Leitrim Community Forum in 2006 and the forum has representation on various Council committees, including three of the Strategic Policy Committees, the County Development Board, as well as being a source of consultation in relation to many Council policies. The Comhairle na nOg Liatroma initiative was continued in 2006.

The programme invites representation from all second level schools in the county, as well as other youth organisations, and is a sounding board for ascertaining the views of young people.

Social Inclusion

A number of initiatives in relation to social inclusion were progressed in 2006. Work began on the research part of the Local Poverty profile and the desk research was completed in December 2006. Focus Groups and case studies will be carried out in 2007 and a final action plan will be produced in 2007.

The National Adult Literacy Agency gave training to Council staff during the year. This provided staff with information on how to communicate in a way which is understood more easily.

In the area of Traveller Accommodation and Rehabilitation the Local Traveller Accommodation Consultative Committee met on three occasions during the year engaging with the local Traveller community on the Traveller Accommodation Programme and the redevelopment of Carrick-on-Shannon Halting Site.

Leitrim County Development Board applied for and received funding from the Gender Equality Unit under the National Development Plan to run a training course for lone parents. The project will be led by County Leitrim Partnership, in conjunction with other agencies, and will provide the necessary skills to help lone parents get good quality employment. The project will commence in February 2007.

Cohesion Process

Work continued under Cohesion Round 1 with the County Development Board co-ordinating initiatives under the project with local development agencies. The Locall number and outreach offices in Carrigallen and Kinlough continued during 2006. These initiatives concluded in December 2006 and the Citizen's Information Centre will continue to provide information on the work of the agencies through its Locall number.

An outside broadcast with the relevant local radio station was organised for each of the 5 local development agencies and the County Development Board. Articles on activities of the agencies were included in the local paper with the

Funding was received for the Volunteering proposal submitted by 4 of the local development agencies through the County Development Board under Cohesion Round 2. This will involve encouraging young people to become more involved in their community and will be rolled out during 2007.

Arts

In 2006 the arts programme saw the development of the youth theatre groups in Carrick-on-Shannon and in Players. These groups are run by professional practitioners and cater for young people aged 14+. Following a series of successful introductory workshops, both groups are working towards productions.

Audience Development - traditional music & visual arts

New projects in the visual arts were initiated in partnership with Leitrim Sculpture Centre, and led by Yvonne Cullivan, Kristaps Gulbis and Angela Conte. A new audience and artist development project in traditional music was initiated with the renowned band Lúnasa. These artists are seeking to develop new audiences for the arts and often work directly with school and community groups.

Support for artists 2006 / 2007

Bursaries for artists for 2006 / 2007 were awarded in 2006 to the following artists who either live and work in, or are originally from Leitrim: Cormac O'Leary, Majella Clancy, Ian Wilson, Ken McDonald, Niall Walsh, Derval Symes, Colm Farrell, Laura Gallagher, Connie Farrell, Sarah Browne, Garreth Kennedy, Brenda McGuire, Dee Armstrong, Christine Mackey, Donal O'Kelly and Ursula Mawson Raffalt. In partnership with the Leitrim Sculpture centre, awards were also made to Dorothy Kolle and Anthony Faulder Mawson.

Arts Act Grants

The members of Leitrim County Council approved Arts Act Grants for 37 groups located throughout the county. These grants helped to support activities such as art classes, exhibitions, drama classes, photography workshops, dance workshops, writers' workshops and circus projects.

Established arts organisations:

Leitrim County Council continued to provide a range of supports to more established arts organisations throughout the county. Financial support was provided to organisations such as Mohill Storytelling Festival, Carrick Water Music Festival, Joe Mooney Summer School, The Glens Centre in Manorhamilton, South Leitrim Area Arts, the Cornmill Theatre in Carrigallen and the John McKenna Group in Drumkeeran. Programme support was also provided to a number of these groups.

The Dock

The Dock continues its exciting and varied programme of exhibitons ranging from work by amateur painters and PLC art students, to unique video installations, to internationally respected photographic and painting exhibitions. Participating artists from Leitrim included Stephen Rennicks, Anthony Faulder Mawson, Dominic Srevens & Djeribi, Keith Nolan, Helen O'Leary along with exhibitions by Chris Doris, Malachy Costello, Sinead Aldridge, Helena Gorey, Paul Chidester and a major exhibition of national and international works from IMMA, curated by staff of In the performing arts, The Dock had 49 theatre performances



(of which 5 were by Carrick Youth Theatre and 8 were by amateur drama groups) 20 music performances, 10 traditional, 5 jazz, 2 classical and 3 folk singers. 11 monthly comedy performances and in Literature, readings from Paul Durcan, Alice Lyons, Theo Dorgan, Paula Meehan, Lisa Steppe, Pat McCabe, Brian Leyden and Ita Daly. The Dock also hosted and presented a wide range of classes from traditional music to drama and oil-painting to

Percent for Art Scheme

The schemes implemented through 2003 - 2005 were celebrated in a new brochure published in 2006. Alongside this, the SPC for Community, Culture and Enterprise Development approved a new approach to public art, taking on-board the recommendations of the report arising out the 2003 - 2005 programme. In 2006, two new schemes were initiated; one scheme was for the commissioning of a new internal artwork for Ballinamore library, the second was a project with young people from the Annaduff / Barnacoola / Dromod / Roosky area which will see them work on the selection and development of an art project in association with the Dromod - Roosky by-pass.

Appointment of a Youth & Community Arts Officer

Leitrim County Council, in partnership with The Arts Council, took a decision to strengthen the resources available to support the development of the arts across the county by appointing a Youth and Community Arts Officer in July 2006 to work directly with youth and community groups on arts projects.

New Arts Strategy for Leitrim

The new arts strategy for 2006 – 2010 was approved by the members of Leitrim County Council in November 2006 following consultation locally and nationally. The new strategy is set out under seven priorities:

Priority 1 – To develop awareness of, and public participation in, the artistic life of Leitrim

Priority 2 – To support professional artists in developing their practice

Priority 3 – To create opportunities for children and young people to explore their artistic

potential and expand their experiences of the arts

Priority 4 – To support the continuing development of new and identified

Leitrim arts organisations

Priority 5 – To develop the Leitrim County Council arts service

Priority 6 – That Leitrim County Council support the continuing development of The Dock

Priority 7 – That Leitrim County Council work to ensure the sustainable development of Leitrim Mobile Cinema

Information Dissemination

and information leaflets in relation to the various services provided. Council staff made presentations to two major National Conferences one in relation to Customer Service and the other on complaint handling.

Leitrim County Council also actively sought opportunities to publicise information to our services and activities in 2006 including a two page spread in the Leitrim Observer on the occasion of the launch of the 2005 Annual Report.

Customer Survey

A general customer service survey was completed in 2006 following on from two previous surveys carried out in 2004 and 2005. The results of the survey were published and actions identified to address the various issues raised.

Participative Democracy

The continued development of the SPC structure, County Development Board, Community Forum, and Dáil na nOg as outlined elsewhere in this report continued to be an invaluable communication forum for the Council and for the general community to engage in a two way communication process.

Fora including the Local Traveller Consultative Committee, Traveller Development Groups, Residents Networks, Homeless Forums etc are important in terms of providing a mechanism to allow input into policy development and mutual understanding of issues.

Newsletters/Education Programmes



The Council maximised the potential of newsletters and education programmes as communication tools in 2006. The County while the "Whats on in Leitrim" Guide has a circulation of 3000 and is published on a bi monthly basis. School visits were undertaken in relation to environmental awareness and Higher Education Grants while the Fire Service undertook site visits, poster competitions in conjunction with schools and public campaigns to increase fire safety awareness. The Junior Achievement Programme was launched in 2006. This programme aims to teach enterprise skills to young

people and to target those at risk of leaving school early. 16 staff have expressed an interest in participating in the programme. Each volunteer is required to give approx 1 hour per week for 5-8 weeks to the programme.

Internal Communications

The internal communications policies developed through the partnership structure continued to be implemented in 2006 with the Intranet, Notice Boards, Section Meetings and the Staff Newsletter being used to significantly improve communications within the organisation.

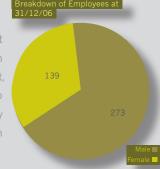

Members Support

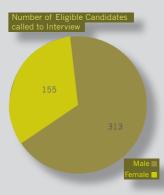

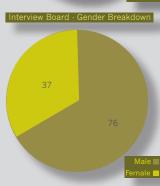
Human Resources

Change Management

The Change Management Unit continued with its role in driving the modernisation and change management agenda within Leitrim County Council. The rollout of the Performance Management Development System (PMDS) was completed in 2006 throughout the staff of Leitrim County Council. A customer service group made up of line managers in each of the Council's Directorates has

Health and Safety

In 2006 compulsory health and safety training was introduced for new recruits starting work with the Council. The Council's Internal Safety Committee was re-established in 2006 and this has greatly assisted in bringing health and safety issues to the fore. 15 representatives sit on the committee from a cross section of Leitrim County Council staff. In accordance with the General Application Regulations 1993, Visual Display Unit assessments were carried out throughout Leitrim County Council. Briefings on changes in legislation were given to staff in October with more to follow in 2007.

ICT

Dear Chairperson and Members,

This report is being presented to the Council in accordance with the requirement of Section 134 of the Local Government Act 2001. The report sets out in summary fashion progress made in relation to commitments set down in the Council's Corporate Plan for the period 2004-2009. The report specifically highlights the progress made during 2006 and follows the same format as the Corporate Plan itself.

The Council continues to promote population growth and economic development through targeted infrastructure provision, proactive forward planning and active marketing and collaboration with other agencies. Substantial progress in relation to the provision of social and physical infrastructure is detailed elsewhere in this with the 2nd highest ever level of applications received. Additional resources have been allocated to the wider planning area to support its efficient administration. 2006 also saw a significant focus on the development of the Leitrim tourism product in conjunction with the County Development Board and in close co-operation with tourism bodies at both local and regional level. Initiatives undertaken include the refurbishment of the 'Old Barrel Store' in Carrick on Shannon as the County's Tourism and Arts Office, development of the very successful Leitrim Roots Festival and commencement of the Cross-Border Angling Project. Funding has also been secured for a new County Marketing Initiative in relation to living, working and investing in Leitrim. The Cross Border Opportunities Project continued to successfully assist participation in various cross border initiatives and has produced a 'Who Does What' and Funding Directory Website. The County's Third Level Initiative was also expanded during the year with UCC being the latest college to come on board. This initiative was shortlisted for the 2006 Chambers Ireland

2. Quality Environment In terms of supporting and safeguarding our Quality

Environment substantial progress continued to be made on the Town & Village Enhancement Programme with works undertaken in a number of locations including Drumshanbo, Keshcarrigan, Fenagh, Killargue and Dowra. Work also commenced on CLÁR Estate Enhancement Projects in a number of our Housing Estates. The Replacement Connacht Waste Management Plan 2006-2011 was adopted and very significant increases in recycling activity were achieved Extensive work was also undertaken with the farming community to facilitate the implementation of the most extensive ever Farm Waste Management Programme and the collection of farm plastics in Leitrim was also a significant environmentaladvance. Activity

in relation to Environmental Enforcement has also increased substantially, particularly in the area of Discharge Licences, Illegal Dumping, C&D Waste, Fly-Tipping and End of Life Vehicles. A comprehensive Environmental Education Programme was also undertaken with significant expansion in the Green Schools Programme and the 'Adopt a Road Scheme'. The 'Adopt a Bring Bank' and the 'Action at Work' Programmes were also successfully developed in the County. Work is also in progress on the development of the Riverside Amenity Park in Carrick on Shannon adding to the overall tourism product of the County.

2006 was another highly successful year in the context of infrastructural delivery both in terms of physical and Project was confirmed and a Design and Build Contract commenced in Quarter 3, with a mid-2008 scheduled completion date. The N4 Carrick-on-Shannon By-Pass also progressed with a contract for underground soil investigation currently underway. Significant progress on the route selection for the N16 realignment was also out on our non national road network and the Regional Road signage programme was completed on the R201 and R280. Work has also commenced on a programme of infrastructural works funded through Development Contributions. Continued progress was made in relation to the Rural Water Programme while construction commenced on the €17m Towns & Villages Sewerage Scheme and the €18m Carrick on Shannon Sewerage Scheme. The midterm review of our Social & Affordable Housing Action Plan was completed during the year with output targets revised and increased, including a significant increase in anticipated Voluntary Housing output. A 36 Unit Voluntary Housing Scheme opened in Manorhamilton in July 2006. provided in Mohill and a new Emergency Tender complete with satellite phone and communication centre has been acquired. In terms of social infrastructure the provision of playgrounds continues to be a priority with the adoption of a Play & Recreation Policy and the opening of new playgrounds in Manorhamilton and Fenagh. The Library and Arts Programmes were also significantly developed and enhanced during the year.

Among the initiatives undertaken in 2006 was the establishment of an Internal Customer Service Working Group to review and progress customer service issues and initiatives. A comprehensive Customer Service Survey was also undertaken and work is ongoing on developing Centre in Manorhamilton is currently under construction which will provide access to a wider range of services in the north of the county. The Council continued to improve its e-services with enhancements in access to online planning information and the launch of our redeveloped website. Our Customer Contact Management System has been fully rolled out and credit and laser card payment facilities have been made available at our Cash Desk. Name Badges have also been introduced for administrative staff The facilities and services available in our Libraries have also been enhanced through optical scanning services, progression of the local studies digitisation project, pilot of a children reading project with the County Childcare Committee and digitisation of newspapers with Leitrim Observer and also availability of other national papers.

5. Community Participation The involvement of the citizens of the county in local

government is critical for a shared understanding of what of community groups, while Comhairle na n-Óg is a worthwhile opportunity for young people to get involved in local government. Leitrim County Council continued to liaise with community groups and encourage their continued development, and that of their areas, through

The Council's Estate Management Programme, Pride of Place and Floral Pride competitions, Cathaoirleachs Awards Scheme, Environmental Awareness Programme and Village Enhancement Programmes are all good examples of community participation which once again worked extremely well during 2006. Work also commenced on the preparation of our Disability Action Plan with the establishment of a Steering Committee and initial discussions with Disability representatives. The Council has also been actively involved in the Traveller Interagency Group, established under the SIMS Group of the County Development Board to co-ordinate the delivery of services and supports to the local Traveller Community. Working Groups have been established in relation to the areas of Accommodation, Health and Education with 3 year Action Plans currently being prepared by each Group.

Leitrim County Council continued to pro-actively interact with the local media throughout 2006 as a noticeboard for activities and with articles and reports on various for the dissemination of information, as are the formal and informal networks such as the Community Forum, the SPCs, the County Development Board, Comhairle na n-Óg and the various interactive workshops used for the preparation of plans etc. The bi-monthly 'Whats On Guide' published by the Arts Office provides detailed information on cultural activities throughout the county. Environmental Education, Estate Management, Community Fire Safety and Community Participation Programmes are all essential to the Council in the context of communications. In 2006 Leitrim County Council also participated in the National Junior Achievement Programme in local primary and secondary schools. The Programme is designed to teach enterprise skills to young people and to target those at risk of leaving school early

2006 saw a continued emphasis on staff training with a particular focus on Health & Safety Training and Disability Awareness. The ICT programme for Elected Members was also progressed together with further development of the Members Extranet. The Council's website was redeveloped during the year coupled with the implementation of a new Content Management System facilitating direct that information is kept up to date. The new Performance Management & Development System (PMDS) has been successfully rolled out throughout the organisation while the national and local Service Indicators have been kept under regular monitoring and review. In the context of financial management, further improvements were made in 2006 in relation to procurement, risk management and health and safety.

Conclusion

The foregoing achievements were made possible through the combined effort of the elected members and staff of this authority. I want to take this opportunity to sincerely thank and publicly acknowledge the effort of all concerned in making significant progress throughout 2006.
